Thanks to Our Friends



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In The Beginning, Today, And Tomorrow

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Fifteen years ago I remember being present in a joint meeting of clients and volunteers for the recently formed Provincetown AIDS Support Group. The PASG was helping approximately twelve PWA's at that time. Everyone had questions concerning the disease, but answers were few and far between. Besides being an apparent death sentence, there was also a social stigma on anyone having the virus. There was a feeling of helplessness among PWA's and with the stigma, the community at large made matters worse. During this first meeting, we discussed the best ways to help our clients who were often without health insurance, unable to

work, financially strapped and terrified. These people with AIDS were our friends and neighbors. When able, they waited on our tables, worked in the shops we frequented and said hello when passing by on the street.

Pasquale Natale brought up creating an auction in order to raise funds for those out of pocket expenses not covered by any support systems a client might have. The community cared and responded to the crisis. People gave what they could. Cash short, an artist would donate a painting for sale. Restaurants donated meals. Oil companies gave fuel to help with the harsh cold winters. Stores gave gift certificates. Many volunteered

time, meal preparation and the always-needed helpful hand. Thus, the community empowered itself and those it helped with this personal approach.

While the new AIDS medications have been miraculously helpful for many PWA's and many of us appear to be doing quite well, this help is not without its own set of problems. The past year has seen at least one death per month from AIDS complications. For many who have the AIDS virus, the new medications work for a time and then stop. New combinations must then be worked out with no guarantee of success. The toxic side

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(Continued from page 1) effects of many of these wonder drugs prevent their successful use in too many cases, often failing after months of carefully balancing the effects of one drug against another. Then, with hope, there are still drugs we haven't yet tried. For one third of those with the virus, none of the drugs work.

For the last fourteen years, we have maintained the premise of helping others while also helping ourselves. Through these years, the PASG and the Auction have both grown. The PASG now provides support services for over two hundred people with HIV/AIDS. Nearly half of these consumers are helped by disbursements through the Non-Reimbursable Fund funded solely by the PASG Auction. The \$50 monthly allotment, besides helping offset financial necessities, also gives those of us dealing with HIV on a daily basis a sense that people still care.

We Are About To Enter A Very Important Time In Our History

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Consumer Biography

The Provincetown AIDS Support Group, its affiliates and services, are funded primarily through contracts with Department of Public Health AIDS Bureau. These contracts total approximately \$1,000,000 annually and are funded on a five-year cycle. This five-year funding cycle ends on June 30, 2002.

We are about to enter a very important time in our history and everyone's assistance is crucial. On Friday, March 23rd, DPH will be hosting a Regional Forum in Taunton that will address the future of AIDS funding in Massachusetts. The primary objectives for the day are 1) to constructively review, discuss and critique the needs of consumers, providers and the consortia service delivery system across the our region; and 2) to com-

plete a formal Statewide Needs Assessment.

This meeting will bring together the eight consortia located in Southeast Massachusetts. At this time consumers will be asked to talk about their experiences with services in their consortium (the Needs Assessment) and providers will be asked to talk about their experiences with delivering services and the financial implications of current funding patterns. These talks will be the basis for our requests for the next five-year cycle.

A strong showing is needed for this meeting in Taunton. Cape Cod is a very unique and separate geographic entity and the PASG has built a strong network of service with this in mind. There is a possibility that our consortium

would have to combine with others in the region and services re-aligned. This would have a very major, and we believe, extremely detrimental impact to what the PASG has to offer. To be blended with agencies in Fall River, New Bedford, Taunton or other areas would make no sense to the strong community support system we have built.

This very important meeting will be from 9:00AM – 4:00PM and transportation will be provided to Taunton. In addition, all consumers attending will receive a \$10 gift certificate to Stop and Shop. Please join us in letting the state know that we prefer to keep our services as they are on Cape Cod. You may signup for this day by stopping in at the PASG or calling 487.9445. Thank you.
