Arthur Bickers, curator of the Provincetown Historical Museum, was master of ceremonies for the unveiling.

The glass works is the gift of Miss Dorothea Setzer of Dennis, in memory of her mother, Mrs. Ella Ottmann Hallett. Miss Setzer has long had an interest in early American glass and a particular interest in the Provincetown Museum. She gave the presentation speech and with Mr. Bickers, paid tribute to the work of the late Melvin T. Nichols of Bass River in behalf of the Museum. Mr. Miller died a year ago. Mrs. Nichols was among special guests at the unveiling.

Mr. Allen, artist, illustrator wood-carver, lives on Route 6A. North Truro, where his big studio houses, together with the familiar materials of the artist, the amazing collection of tools some of them he contrived or fashioned, himself - that he used to make the glass furnace and its accompanying mechanical devices. Besides its unique artistic value, the glass works model is also considered a remarkable embediment of the mechanics of early glass-making. Mr. Allen described the model at the unveiling and gave a brief history of American glass-making.
