Dedicated on August 5, 1910, to commemorate the landing of the band of Pilgrims in the "Mayflower," November 11, 1620. The shaft is 252 feet and 7 inches high, and cost \$90,000—of which the United States Government gave \$40,000; Massachusetts \$25,000; the town of Provincetown \$5,000; and associations and individuals the balance.
