The parade will then proceed to Town Wharf via Center, Bradford, Howland and Commercial Streets where the Women's Relief Corps and planes will strew flowers on the waters "to honor the memory of those veterans who sleep beneath the ocean's waves that our Nation might live". The parade will then return to Town Hall and disband, which will end the exercises for the day.
