

# Compact

Signed in the cabin of the "Mayflower"  
in Provincetown Harbor, Nov. 11, 1620

In the name of God, Amen.

We, whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread sovereign, Lord King James, by the grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, etc., having undertaken for the glory of God and advancement of the Christian faith and the honor of our King and country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually, in the presence of God, and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation and furtherance of the ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions, and offices from time to time as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cape Cod, the 11th of November, in the year of the reign of our sovereign Lord King James of England, France, and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth. Anno Domini, 1620.



## Mrs. Cook, 95, Keen - Active

A smiling and chipper Carrie Knowles Cook of Hyannis was surrounded by some 30 members of her family Saturday evening during a dinner party at the Sheraton-Hyannis given in honor of her 95th birthday. Mrs. Cook, the widow of the late Irving W. Cook, achieved that wonderful age Feb. 5.

Present for the occasion were her four daughters, Mrs. Hugh Ferguson of Barnstable, Mrs. Joseph H. Swift Jr. of Centerville, Mrs. Richard A. Henry of Madison, N.J. and Mrs. Kempton Howland of Andover as well as seven of her nine grandchildren and seven of her 12 great grandchildren.

Mrs. Cook was born in Provincetown and came to Hyannis as a bride. Her husband was president of the then First National Bank of Hyannis which in turn became Hyannis Trust and now has merg-

ed to become Cape Cod Bank and Trust Company.

Later in their married life they moved to New Bedford where Mr. Cook took over the presidency of the First National Bank of New Bedford.

Keen, and loving every minute of her 95 years, Mrs. Cook maintains her own home. She plays cards weekly with friends on Thursdays, attends the Hyannis Federated Church and meetings of the Unity Guild of that church.

Quite aside from a well rounded social life, the nonegenarian keeps trim by walking to the store for her own groceries and other items, conceding to a taxi only on the return trip when laden with her purchases.

Her daughters say of Mrs. Cook that she is "remarkable, wonderful and sweet," and what more could any mother ask as tribute?
