11 Bradford Street is a 1 1/2-story, 3-bay, Greek Revival sidehall cottage; the front-gable roof is clad in asphalt shingle, with partial cornice returns, an interior brick chimney is located near the roof ridge.; the exterior is clad in vinyl and the foundation is brick; the fenestration includes 2/1 wood DHS with storms and wood trim; the primary entrance contains a pane and panel wood door with a simple wood trim surround and a storm door, the side facades contain modern pane and panel doors
