Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings in the community.

6 Mozart Avenue is a 1 1/2-story, 3-bay building, facing west, with a 1-story section to the south. The side gable roof is clad in asphalt shingles; large shed wall dormer completes 2-story height on east façade; concrete block south gable end chimney. The main entry consists of a pane and panel aluminum door with brick and concrete stoop. A secondary entry is located at the rear (east), with a pane and panel aluminum door with wood storm. Fenestration includes 1/1 vinyl DHS flanking central entry; Chicago window on north gable end; 2/2 DHS in the shed wall dormer; single-pane vinyl sliding windows in 1-story section.
