

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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

2-story, 4-5-bays, roof clad in asphalt shingles; fenestration is irregular and includes 6/6 wood DHS and 9/6 wood windows with a fixed top sash and hopper bottom sash; primary entrance consists of a wood storm door with wood surround and brick step, located near the northwest corner in a shed-roof extension; attached on the south gable end to a 1-story, 4-5 bay building on brick piers, with a wood pane and panel door, wood storm, 3/3 wood DHS, paired 6-pane wood casements and 6/6 wood DHS
