
## ADMINISTRATION

# CURRICULUM

Provincetown High School offers five programs of study--technical and classical college preparatory, commercial, household arts, vocational, and general. These courses provide a diversified curriculum to meet the needs of all the students.

The college courses are planned so that they provide the student, each year, with a background in English, mathematics, history, science, and foreign languages. Success in this field gives each student the necessary credits to enter college.

The commercial course is designed to assist students in preparing themselves for further education in the field of business. Among the subjects offered are stenography, typing, bookkeeping, and business mathematics. These courses, if studied as a terminal course, enable the student to immediately begin work after graduation.

Two vocational courses are offered. Household arts teaches the basic fundamentals of homemaking. Through courses in cooking, sewing, history, mathematics, and English, the girls are prepared to be successful homemakers and assets to their communities. For the boys that are mechanically inclined, Provincetown High School offers a complete course in automotive training. After graduating from this course, a boy is qualified to obtain a position as a mechanic.

Another course offered is a general course which offers the student a more liberal high school education. The subjects included in the general course are arranged so that the student is sufficiently prepared for employment after graduation.

All these courses are flexible enough so that the students can choose electives in fields of personal interest, thus making a more rounded and stimulating curriculum. The physical well-being of the students is not neglected, for an extensive physical education program is required of each student.

Provincetown High School tries to instill in its students the ideals that will prepare them for future life and also enable them to be better assets to their community and their country.


## THE KEYS TO SUCCESS





## SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Today is June 10, 1965. As I sit here on the Town Hall stage nervously glancing at my classmates dressed in their caps and gowns, I recall many happy memories.

I remember how strangely adult those stairs leading to the top floor of P. H. S. seemed to me and to the rest of the Class of 1965 as we ascended them for the first time in September, 1961. Chosen as our leaders during our Freshman year were Christopher Ormsby, President; Edward Veara, Vice-President; Judith Lane, Secretary; and John Atkins, Treasurer. To complete our slate of officers, we elected Agnes Trahar and David Salvador to represent us on the Student Council. A unanimous vote made Mr. Thomas Kane our class advisor.

Although the year wasn't a financial success, the Class of '65 made itself known in our fields of endeavor, especially athletics. Those Freshmen filling the ranks on the football squad were John Atkins, Carlton Fetner, Christopher Ormsby, Daniel Peters, Richard Russe, David Salvador, Edward Veara, and Joseph Ward.

The basketball team, too, felt the support of our class with the following members on the team: Stephen DeRiggs, Paul Mendes, Christopher Ormsby, Joseph Thomas, Edward Veara, and Joseph Ward.

Our sophomore year finds its place among many memories as we again climbed the hill to the familiar brick structure in September, 1962.

Once again, we found ourselves in need of officers and made our choice during the opening weeks of school. We elected Joseph Ward, President; John Fields, Vice-President; Judith Lane, Secretary; and Mary Fratus, Treasurer. Taking their places on the Student Council were Linda Corea and Edward Veara. Undertaking the duties of class advisor for the sophomores was Mrs. Phebe Rogers.

Once again we were represented in P. H. S. athletics by George Adams, Bruce Aho, Robert Anthony, John Atkins, John Gutzler, Christopher Ormsby, Richard Russe, David Salvador, Francis Santos, Christopher Silva, Edward Veara, and Joseph Ward, the assets of our football team.

In basketball, George Adams, Stephen DeRiggs, Christopher Ormsby, Richard Russe, Christopher Silva, John Lee Silva, Edward Veara and Joseph Ward were our stars.

I recall now the Junior year of the class of '65, and what a year it was! The first business of the year was to elect the officers who would lead us through this all-important year. They were John Fields, President; Joseph Ward, Vice-President; Judith Lane, Secretary; and Elizabeth Lema, Treasurer. Mary Fratus, David Salvador, and Edward Veara were our choice for Student Council representatives, and Mr. Edward Dahill consented to advise us during the year.

This year, George Adams, Bruce Aho, Robert Anthony, Stephen DeRiggs, John Fields, Tamson Garran, Vincent Pacellini, Christopher Ormsby, Richard Russe, David Salvador, Francis Santos, Christopher Silva, Edward Veara, and Joseph Ward took their places on the varsity football squad.

With the same boys on the basketball team, Provincetown went all the way to the top by winning the Class D Tech Tourney. I'm sure everyone recalls the excitement as our team pulled ahead in the closing quarter of the game.

Our Junior year was full of refreshment committees, cake sales, a car wash, and many other activities to clear a path for our class trip. The climax of the year came to pass on May 22, 1964--the Junior Prom. The boys in their white tuxedos, the girls in their lovely gowns, and the beautiful decorations set the stage for memories which are ours alone and not to be shared.

All too soon, September came again to Provincetown, bringing with it the beginning of the end of our high school career. To lead us on to the all important event of the year, our class officers were John Fields, President; Joseph Ward, Vice-President; Nancy Santos, Secretary; and Elizabeth Lema, Treasurer. Our Student Council representatives were Linda Corea, David Salvador and Edward Veara. Mr. Elmer Silva became our class advisor.

Our class was as active as ever. Football season came and went. Basketball, the class trip, our class play, everything is now behind us--just a memory to fifty-nine students who are now being launched into adulthood.

This is the history of the Provincetown High School graduating class of 1965. I hope others will benefit from our mistakes and will, in turn, have memories as dear as those which we cherish.



## THE JUNIOR CLASS


Realizing the seriousness of choosing responsible class officers to lead us during our Sophomore year, we


## PROVINCETOWN VOCATIONAL SCHOOL


This year our school is reaping the benefits of a spacious modern shop, which has many new pieces of equipment enabling us to keep pace with modern automotive engineering.

Perhaps the best example of this is our new engine analyzer. This analyzer is used to provide a complete engine checkup by locating the sources of trouble electronically. In a matter of minutes, the tune-up expert can locate and separate any engine trouble and pinpoint it to the individual valve, gasket, faulty wire, or any other malfunction.

The analyzer uses a television-type screen to show the actual performance of the engine. This machine also provides a check on the work performed by the student mechanic.

However, no machine is a complete substitute for the trained mechanic. Thus we receive through training in such courses as mathematics, theory, and related academic studies.






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## THE P.H.S. FOGHORN

# FOOTBALL 1964



## FOOTBALL

After only fourteen days of practice, we started using an entirely new system set up by our head coach Steve Goveia, Provincetown High's football squad knew that they were in for a trying first few weeks of football. However, under the excellent guidance of Mr. Goveia, co-captains Richard Russe and Joe Ward, the team shaped up fast and was ready physically for its first encounter, Hanover, on their own gridiron.

Provincetown kicked off to Hanover on September 26 at 1:30 P.M. and thus began one of the best seasons for the Fishermen in many years. After holding Hanover on downs, Provincetown obtained the ball and scored almost immediately on a picture pass from quarterback Ed Veara to end Steve DeRiggs. With Veara holding and Ward kicking, Provincetown also gained the one point conversion. Late in the second quarter, however, Hanover took the lead with a touchdown and two point conversion set up by a costly interception. Having regained confidence, Hanover dominated the second half by scoring two touchdowns and by winning the game 20-7.

Our second game, against Apponoquet Regional of Lakeville, saw the Fishermen fare little better. Although the two teams battled to a bruising 0-0 tie in the first half, Apponoquet, following Hanover's second half example, took the lead on an interception touchdown and scored the clincher on a quarterback sneak which barely carried into Provincetown's end zone.

Martha's Vineyard was Provincetown's third opponent in the Fisherman's 1964 campaign. Played on the island, the game seemed destined to be one of misery. At game time, a heavy downpour of rain was falling; but, after a short deliberation between coaches, it was decided that the game would be played. Vineyard almost scored twice, once on its first set of downs and later on its last series. Both times they made long gains to two yards from the goal but Provincetown's defense held. Provincetown also had its chance to score, only to be thwarted by island's defensive unit. Thus, after a rash of fumbles, good and bad breaks, and a totally wet and miserable game, the two teams settled for a scoreless tie. There was one after effect to the game. Because Vineyard had used the wrong kind of lime in lining the field, several Provincetown players had received serious chemical burns. Because of these burns and the misery that accompanied them, we vowed to beat Vineyard in our second encounter later on in the season.

Dover Sherborn, a new school, was our next opponent. Held by our strong defense and unable to stop our rolling offense, Sherborn was stopped by the Fishermen of

Provincetown by a score of 14-8. It was Provincetown all the way as the team, in their first home game, made an impressive showing by outplaying the visitors from the word "go." Two notes, however, should be added to this game. The first is that Dover Sherborn's only score came late in the fourth period against Provincetown's second team defense. The second is praise for David Salvador, who handled the Provincetown scoring singlehandedly and who ground out a startling and most impressive 237 yards.

After our first win of the season against Dover Sherborn, we were on our way to a three game winning streak. Our next opponent was Nantucket. We played perhaps our finest game of the season beating Nantucket 28-0. The entire team really played hard for that win.

The following Saturday we were to play Martha's Vineyard. We eagerly awaited this game in order to pay them back for the hospitality which they gave us in our first encounter. When the final gun sounded, we had defeated Martha's Vineyard 6-0. However, the final score doesn't tell the complete story. We fumbled three times inside their twenty yard line. Had the fumbles not occurred, the score might have been different.

Our next opponent was a much improved Dennis-Yarmouth team. Provincetown was up for the game, but somehow we couldn't get untracked on either offense and defense. We were beaten 28-0 by D-Y.

Nantucket was our next and final opponent of the season. After a long trip by boat to the island, the team seemed to be tired yet more than eager to play the game. Throughout the entire game, we could not get a substantial drive going on offense. After a frustrating afternoon, the final score was 0-0. We had to settle for a tie in our last football game of the season. For thirteen Senior players, it was a tough way to end their football careers.

Our final record was 3-3-2. This isn't a winning record in newspapers, but for the Seniors it will always be an outstanding one.

Enough can't be said about the individual stars of the team. David Salvador, who finished fifth in the Cape scoring column, was by far the best back Provincetown has had for a while. Quarterback Ed Veara did an outstanding job running the team throughout the season. Linemen Steve DeRiggs, Richard Russe, Joe Ward, Bruce Aho, Francis Santos, Tamson Garran, and Chris Silva each did an outstanding job, opening holes and blocking. Though out-weighted in all the games, their desire carried them through with flying colors.




On Tuesday, December 8, Provincetown hosted last year's co-champion, Harwich High School. The game was

## Boys' Basketball

In our next encounter, the team traveled to Chatham to meet a much improved Blue Devil Squad. Led by 6'5" Willard Nickerson and 6'5" Dick Scott, Chatham handed Provincetown its second setback 52-40. Joe Ward was the only bright spot for Provincetown scoring 16 points in a losing cause.

For our fourth game, Provincetown met a scrappy Dennis-Yarmouth Five on the latter's home court. The game was "nip and tuck" all the way, with the Green Dolphins pulling out the win, 43-42, in the last seconds. This was the third straight loss suffered by the Fishermen, whose record fell 1-3.

On January 6, the undefeated Nauset Warriors were our opponents on our home court. Although Nauset was heavily favored, Provincetown handed them their first setback 51-50. Steve DeRiggs led all scorers with 17 points followed by Veara and Gracie with 11. For the Fishermen it was a win needed for them to keep their hopes for a tourney berth alive.

Provincetown's next victory was at the expense of Sandwich High School. In the game, Provincetown doubled the score of its opponent 74-37 and used the second string much of the last half. Joe Ward with 21 points and Ed Veara with 20, led the Fishermen's attack, while Steve DeRiggs added 12 points.

Barnstable was the next opponent on the Red Raiders' home floor. After an almost disastrous start, Provincetown trailed by twenty-two points early in the game. The Fishermen staged a fantastic closing rally which fell short

by a single point, 52-51. Veara, Silva, and DeRiggs had double figures for the Fishermen with Veara's 17, tops.

Falmouth visited the Cape Tip on January 15th only to be overhauled by the Fishermen 65-52. Provincetown played one of its best games, and completely dominated the play. Ed Veara (20), Steve DeRiggs (15), and Joe Ward (10) spearheaded Provincetown's attack.

Provincetown's next game was with the league-leading Harwich Rough Riders. Harwich's seven game win streak was on the line when they clashed with the Fishermen. Before a capacity crowd, Provincetown upset the Rough Riders 56-49. This was Harwich's second loss of the season both of which were to Provincetown. Joe Ward and Ed Veara paced the attack with 18 and 15 points respectively.

After the exciting Harwich game, Provincetown encountered an aggressive Bourne Five. Provincetown tried desperately to keep its Tech Tourney chances alive, but was defeated by a score of 68-53. Ed Veara with 18 points and Steve DeRiggs with 14 points led Provincetown in the losing effort.

As the LONG POINTER goes to press the Fishermen have a 5-5 league record and are currently in fourth place in the Cape standings. Provincetown still has a chance for the Tech Tournament as well as the Principal's Tournament but only by hard work and a good team effort will this become a reality.




### CHEERLEADERS PROVIDE TEAM INSPIRATION





